Annual Convention.

FIRST TIME OUTSIDE OF BOSTON

Interesting Four Days' Program Has
Been Prepared.—Final Event
\$1,000 Bonfire of Discarded Ma-
terial.

Bridgeport, Conn., Sept. 12.—Holding its yearly meeting for the first time in its history outside of Boston, the Photographers Association of New England to-day opened its fourteenth annual convention at Steeplechase Island. The sessions are to last four days, and in addition to the business of the convention, receptions, a banquet, promenades, sightseeing tours, demonstrations of photography in its various ramifications and the annual dance, will occupy the attention of the delegates about one thousand of whom are expected during the week. In addition an elaborate exhibition of samples of the photographic art, and a wide variety of the product of photographic supplies manufactures will be opened to the delegates and public. A feature of the closing day will be a costly bonfire when about \$100,000 worth of photographic material, which by reason of the advance in the art, has been discarded by photographers and manufacturers, will be fed to the flames. To-day has been designated Pennsylvania, Ohio, Delaware and New Jersey day, to-morrow will be New York day, Thursday Manufacturers' day and Friday, Bridgeport, Amateur and Carnival day.
