ALFRED'S LAST HANDBK OF MURKIN.

Shortly after 9 o'clock suits of clothes for the condemned men were brought in; again Edward manifested great indifference to his personal appearance. He was forced to dress with difficulty. While the boys were dressing, their mother, three sisters Mrs. Lawry and occupied old ladies who had been in deep mourning, and were given seats in the ante-chamber of the jail. Father Abraham and Captain, two Quakerish citizens from St. Joseph, administered the last sacraments.

THEY WAITED AT DEATH.

At 10 o'clock, July 22.—The Talbott boys were hanged at Maryville today for the murder of their father. They suffered to their last moments implicating several other parties. No one spoke up, they made a confession that one of the boys killed the old man, because he was beating his mother. Their friends were all disgusted at their different stories and no sympathy was felt for them. They ate heartily and laughed and joked with the jail guards. The gallows is set on the side of a hill where all creation can see and the whole population of the country was on hand. The boys hung up wonderfully well this morning. The portion from the mother, a little after noon, was very interesting. The procession started for the gallows at 1 o'clock.
