They had succeeded in opening the shutter without breaking the fastening, and but for the fortunate waking of Al. would doubtless have entered the house and stolen whatever valuables they could find handy. Ben. Torrance's and Joe Jackson's residences were also entered by the thieves, but at what hour of the night is not known. At the house of the former they took Mr. Torrance's pants out doors and stole therefrom \$79 in money and a valuable gold watch, and at the house of the latter they made a haul of about \$18 in money, but did not touch anything else. Dr. Hackedorf's residence was also entered about midnight. Here they stole Emmet Ham's watch and \$2 in money. An attempt was made to break into the dwelling of John Welch, but after forcing open one of the windows of the house the thieves went away.

As yet no clue has been obtained that will bring these thieves to justice. They probably belong to an organized gang of professionals who thoroughly understand their business and after once having raided a town leave for parts unknown.
